1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Dharmanand Uniyal Government Degree College, Narendranagar caters to the Higher Education needs of all the prospective students residing in adjoining cities and villages. Established in the year 2006 christened as “Govt Degree College Narendranagar” and changed to “Dharmanand Uniyal Government Degree College Narendranagar in 2016, the college provides a plethora of programs to suit diverse academic needs. Students join the college to shape their dreams and academic aspirations in a healthy and progressive environment. Ably guided by dynamic and well-qualified faculties, they learn to strive for the best.

Spread over an area of 2 hectares, the college is nestled in a very picturesque location in the Shivalik foothills at an altitude of 1277 mt. It embraces extraordinary scenic beauty with an aerial view of Rishikesh, Haridwar and Ganga flowing from mountains to the Plains of Haridwar.

Initially, the College started only with Commerce Department functioning in two rooms. Gradually, to satiate the growing academic ambitions of the region, it was upgraded to 8 programs with PG program in commerce. The college is the only government college in the entire region to provide 4 professional courses at a very nominal fee structure. The total strength of students is approximately 300, the majority belonging to rural and semi-urban areas.

At present, there are 25 faculties in the college having Ph.D./NET/SLET. The teaching-learning process is strengthened through seminars, field visits and use of various ICT resources. The college has vibrant units of NSS and Red ribbon club which are actively engaged in varied extension activities. Our students have achieved excellent results in university exams, securing top positions in the university merit list. 2 students have secured gold medal at the university level. 2 students are receiving INSPIRE scholarship. Many cells like Anti-Ragging Cell, Career Counselling and Placement Cell, Internal Complaint Cell etc are actively working for student support.

Situated amid idyllic, serene surroundings, thus providing the right ambience for teaching and learning, the college strives to achieve excellence in the field of education by equipping its students with the latest knowledge and skills, while inculcating in them basic human values.

- No nearby industry and good academic institutions for practical exposure, internship, or placement.
- Most of the departments are single faculty departments.
- Lack of well designed and equipped laboratories.
- Very few capacity building training for skill and knowledge enhancement for non teaching staff

Institutional Opportunity

- To enhance and strengthen the knowledge in the public domain in nearby rural areas with the help of expertise available in the college.
- To build global competencies in semi-urban and rural students especially female students to face the world challenges.
- Students have ample opportunities to participate in extension activities for better exposure.
- Students can benefit from the rich research experience of faculties having publications in SCI/SCOPUS-listed journals.
- Can organize more industrial tours and educational trips in future.
- E-granthalaya, NDLI , E-Books and E-journals.

Institutional Challenge

- Students have a weak academic foundation, hindering the pace of their potential academic growth.
- Limited participation of parents in PTA and least involvement of parents in the academic interest of their wards.
- Generally, students belong to rural areas with poor socio-economic backgrounds often lack the financial, social, and educational support from their family.
- Placement/employment opportunities for students.
- The development of the college is restricted due to the dependence on state government policies.
- The college's affiliation with the university often prevents it from acting autonomously for implementing strategies.
- Students dropout due to the lack of family support and poor accessibility of college by public transport.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college is committed to academic excellence and overall development of its students. The goals and objectives of the college are communicated systematically to all constituents and clearly stated in the prospectus which is updated every year.

Since the college is an affiliated institute, it has to adhere to the guidelines and framework of the curricula chalked out by the Board of studies, constituted by the parent university.

The college adheres to Academic Calendar to ensure proper and effective functioning. Individual departments prepare an action plan which includes teaching plan and extra-curricular activities schedule.

The Departments ensure effective curriculum delivery through invited talks, lectures, workshops, field visits, experiential learning through laboratory experiments, Field-work and dissertations.

Seminars are organized by the Departments at regular interval in which students participate enthusiastically. Assignments given are prepared by the students with the help of Faculty members. The Head of Departments ensure the effective implementation and timely completion of prescribed syllabi.

With modest resources the college makes teaching and learning innovative and interactive by providing modern teaching aids like smart board, LCD Projectors and computers with internet etc. EDUSAT that is linked to the Uttarakhand Open University provides distance learning through audio-visual and multimedia aids.

The college prioritizes and ensures to integrate human values, gender equality, environment and ethical awareness in curriculum.

The feedback from stakeholders is collected, analyzed and appropriate measures are taken to improve teaching and learning process.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution has a number of courses ably run by a galaxy of competent and learned faculty. The faculty is highly qualified, experienced and motivated. A good student -teacher ratio promotes a favorable learning environment for the learner. This is reflected in the high pass percent of students across various streams. The learning outcomes and program outcomes are conveyed to the students. They are available in the college website too. Hard copy of syllabus, course outcome and learning outcome is available in the department it is communicated to the student during the induction program and introductory classes during syllabus and program discussion with student. Attainment of POs and COs is assessed from the performance of students in the internal tests, assignments, Practical Examination and the day- to-day laboratory classes their progress, responses and attentiveness and enthusiasm in the classroom. Fast learners are given extra attention in the form of special guidance similarly slow learners are considered for remedial classes. The average pass percent is considered to be an indication of the collective progress of the class. Students have been taken to field visits, industry visits. By engaging in such experiential learning students are able to connect knowledge learned in the classroom to real world situations. The students are engaged in extension activities through the medium of national service scheme wing. The students visit the nearby villages and conduct awareness camps and rallies. It provides an opportunity to the student where he can achieve professional as well as civic responsibility, knowledge and a skill set that is helpful to him when he steps out of the college.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Dharmanand Uniyal Government Degree College Narendranagar is constantly attempting to develop a favorable environment for extensions and innovations. The institution has a vibrant innovation club that gives students the chance to collaborate with teachers and their peers for the purpose of sharing knowledge and creativity. The college's vision and mission encourage students to participate in a variety of extracurricular activities in order to fulfil their civic duties and develop into responsible citizens.

Project work is given to PG (M.Com) students with the goal of developing their research orientation . Students receive valuable instruction and healthy interaction to keep them apprised about current events in their disciplines. College departments include students in a variety of extracurricular activities to develop and enhance their scientific temperament. These platforms offer a venue for the display of academic brilliance and encourage communication within and outside of the academy. The college library, computer lab, and career counselling office also expose students to certain opportunities and facilities.

By organizing plantation and cleaning campaigns on various occasions throughout the year, the college's active NSS wing helps to responsibly maintain the cleanliness and greenery of the adjacent communities.

The majority of the college's teachers are involved in research and academic writing and submit their articles to journals that are Scopus or UGC indexed. Three teachers of the college have been awarded by the USERC (Uttarakhand Science Education & Research Centre) and other agencies for significant contribution to their respective subjects and organizing community extension activities. The college's "Green Campus Clean Campus," environment preservation, and promotion initiatives have received praises from the forest department, Tehri Garhwal, and nagar palika parishad, Narendranagar. Four teachers of the college were engaged in linkage/collaboration programmes or activities to share knowledge and creative ideas. One teacher published her patent as a 9th author in Indian Journal of Patent.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college is spreading across the area of 20,000 sqmtrs with lush green surrounding. The campus of the college houses the administrative building, Faculty of Arts, Staff room, Library, Gymnasium, Examination Section, NSS Room, Conference Hall and a well-equipped Computer Lab. In the Academic building there are Departments for the faculty of Science, Commerce, Journalism & Mass Communication and Tourism studies as well as 6 class rooms that can each accommodate 40 students. A multipurpose hall at the college can accommodate more than 200 people. The multipurpose hall is equipped with a badminton court as well. The College Library with 9064 books is automated with e-Granthalaya. The books are being issued using the bar code scan. The application process for NDLI club membership has begun. By allocating a portion of the total state funding for the purchase of the book, the College continue to make deliberate efforts to improve the library resources. For the optimum interests of the students, the library has an aim to soon subscribe to e-books and digital resources. The college administration has made concerted efforts to provide best of the ICT facilities to the college. The college campus had Wi-Fi connection with a 20Mbps internet leased line from JIO till mid-2022. 24 best configuration HP desktops has been purchased under RUSA project. The college facilitated registration of the admission applicants through its official website for the academic year 2021–2022. The college has designated land for development of the basketball court. The platform of the same is prepared and further work is under process. About 100% of annual grant- in- aid (excluding salary components) from the state government is utilized for the infrastructure augmentation and sustaining academic support facilities.

Student Support and Progression

In order to provide holistic development to Students College regularly organizes various capacity development programs like career counseling sessions and personality development programs for honing soft skill and communication skills of the students thus making them more employable.

In order to promote a progressive environment college provides mentoring to students for participating in various state and central level competitive exams. For facilitating a gender sensitive and congenial environment the college has a dedicated Women Grievance Cell and Anti Ragging Committee. Anti Drug Committee of the college works for creating awareness about the use of Tobacco and other kinds of Drug Abuse among students.

To increase the employability among students, college provides placement guidance and assistance and regular talks by experts for the benefit of students. For attaining academic excellence students are motivated to enroll in master programs. The college believes in an all round development of body and mind and organizes various sports events in which students participate actively. Students have brought great laurels to the college by securing various positions in state and national level competitions. NSS unit of College regularly organizes social welfare activities and awareness programs for developing responsive citizens of the country.

Alumni Association cell of College is functioning since its inception in 2019 and since then 2 Alumni meet have been organized for building relations among students and forming a strong alumni network.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The vision and mission of the institute is executed efficiently. Protection of the right of women and minority and to guarantee the welfare of the students specially belonging to the marginalized community is the motto of the institution. There is decentralization and delegation of power in policy and decision making. It is reflected in the fact that various committees have been constituted and entrusted with the responsibility of implementing the programs and policies of the college. The head of the institution is assisted by the faculty and the non-teaching staff, administrative staff, laboratory staff to fulfill the academic, financial and administrative duties. The college is a government institution which adheres to the Uttarakhand State Government policies. It follows a hierarchical set up established by Directorate of Higher Education, with clear-cut duties, responsibilities, accountability and authorities. The academic calendar is provided by the Directorate of Higher Education. The admission and examination process is governed by the affiliating university. The principal as the team leader ensures a wholesome environment in the institute for the holistic growth of the students. The governance practices followed in the college aim to achieve the goal of providing quality and inclusive education to around 350 students from economically weaker sections of the society having a limited exposure to the modern pedagogy. Students receive not only academic but also vocational knowledge which makes them more employable. <p>2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):</p>	<p>Academic bank of credits All the first year students enrolled under NEP have created an ID through Digilocker and academic Bank of credits. A workshop was conducted by the college to orient the students on the concept of academic Bank of credit. The students were made aware about the significance of credit system and multiple entry and exit points offered in NEP. Students were motivated to enroll in platforms offering online courses on like SWAYAM, COURESE ERA, edX and NPTEL where they can register and score credits required for completion of the program (or even additional credits).</p>

Therefore the university has designed the curriculum in such a way that student has to take one skill enhancing course in each semester for first two years of the degree program. Response:

Dharmanand Uniyal Govt Degree College Narendranagar is affiliated to Sri Dev Suman University, Badshahithaul, Tehri Garhwal, Uttarakhand. The institution follows university prescribed curriculum and takes efforts to achieve academic excellence by adopting academic flexibility measures.

Under HNB Garhwal (Central) University affiliation, the institute followed Choice based credit system (CBCS), for under graduate and Post Graduate program till 2017 batch. Since 2018, as per the state government's directives, the college got affiliated to Sri Dev Suman University and adhered to the guidelines and framework of the curricula prescribed by the university and followed the annual system of examination in UG programs and for semester system in professional and masters courses. From the session 2022 under the NEP semester system has been introduced.

Planning Process:

- At the commencement of the academic year, all the Department in charge along with head of institution, conduct a meeting and discuss teaching & learning activities to be followed in the ensuing session.
- The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery by preparing its own academic calendar in advance based on the affiliating university's calendar. The academic calendar enlists all important events in a chronological order. Thereafter each department formulates its own action plan for effective implementation of the academic calendar.
- Department in charge allocates papers to the teachers and prepares the timetable reflecting the theory classes, laboratory classes and tutorials. Program outcomes and course outcome are prepared and followed.
- Orientation/induction program is scheduled in the beginning of the new session for the fresh batch.
- The teacher prepares their individual plan. Class tests/ internal assessments are conducted periodically throughout the semester/year. Progress of the syllabus coverage and curriculum delivery is reviewed from time to time.
- Apart from regular classes, tutorials or extra classes are taken for helping the weak students and inaccessible materials like notes, books are provided to them.
- In addition to traditional classroom teaching, faculty members also use various ICT tools and other innovative teaching strategies including online teaching through student conducive platform like Zoom, Google meet, Whatsapp, jamboard etc.
- Feedbacks from students on curriculum and other parameters have been collected and analyzed to strengthen the future curriculum development.

- Departments of the college have planned and implemented the programs to promote general and conveyable skills among the students through use of modern aids like LCD projectors, study tours, excursions, field visits, debates, class room seminars, Quiz Competitions, and Chart/Poster presentation, etc.
- The Academic Calendar of the year is prepared in compliance with the academic schedule of affiliating University by academic committee of the college with the approval of the Principal. Number of working days required as per university guidelines and institutional academic calendar is strictly followed.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

Learner-centric method shifts the focus light to the students instead of teachers, in contrast to the traditional teaching methods. Here, instead of being a mere receiver of information, the students actively participate in their own discovery process. The curriculum is so designed by the university that the students have to take responsibility of their own learning. The college promotes team-learning by giving the students group assignments like group discussions, brain storming and making a model for the laboratory. They are actively involved in various departmental activities. These activities are wholesome, aiming for a holistic growth of the students. Academic activities like student-lectures, group discussions, quizzes are conducted department wise. Extra-curricular activities are also a very important medium to create a conducive growth environment for the learner. Activities like presenting the pressing social and academic issues in the form of debates, speeches, poster presentation are conducted. Singing and dance competitions, are also part of our curriculum and conducted that take a local flavor. These also help in creating an atmosphere where the boundaries that separate the teacher and the taught are diffused. The subjects which are practical-based are so framed as to inculcate participative learning. They require the student to come in groups and solve the problems. Thus problem solving behavior is inculcated in them the same time as participative learning. The students also learn to work in teams and develop societal skills which help them in future.

Students have been taken to field visits and/or industry visits. Mass communication students are taken to public events to learn media coverage for print as well as digital media. Science students have been taken to science city. In some courses like tourism, field visits are the part of curriculum requirement. By engaging in such experiential learning, students are able to apply the knowledge learned in the classroom to real world situations.

Signing of MOU between a leading resortier-entrepreneur in the local area is a big step towards providing a platform to students for experiential learning. The college is also actively engaged in extension activities

through the medium of National Service Scheme wing. The students visit the nearby villages and conduct awareness camps on issues like public hygiene, drug and tobacco use, AIDS, alcohol use, anemia and other nutritional deficiencies. These direct experiences inculcate a feeling of social responsibility in the student. They become aware of the important role that they can play in the society. Moreover, the thought of them being able to make a difference to the society instills a great deal of self confidence in them. The students also learn to identify the social issues. They try to think of the solutions that are feasible in their scenario and in the process; they become a part of the solution. It provides an opportunity to the student where he can achieve professional as well as civic responsibility, knowledge and a skill set that is helpful to him when he steps out of the college.

2.6.1 Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and attainment of POs and COs are evaluated

Response:

Learning outcome is that tangible, observable and measurable change in the student that is achieved after attaining knowledge under a particular program or course. Learning outcomes focus on the students. They are student centric in the sense that they do not depend on what the instructor is teaching but also on what changes the student observe in themselves after receiving the knowledge.

College has clearly displayed learning outcomes of program and courses for each programme in the college website. Hard copy of syllabus, course outcome and learning outcome is available in the department and is communicated to the student during the induction program and even discussed during introductory classes along with syllabus and program discussion. The importance of learning outcome and course outcome is

communicated to the teachers in the departmental meetings while students are made aware of the course outcome and program outcome through interaction with respective teachers .

Based on the performance of students in the internal tests, assignments, Practical Examination and the day-to-day laboratory classes their progress in attainment of PO and CO is assessed. How they respond in the classroom, what queries they raise during the teaching, the quality of assignments they submit, how resourceful they are while performing the projects and assignments which they have been given, how disciplined they are during their stay in the classroom and out of the classroom are all measures to assess their level of attainment of the program outcomes.

There holistic performance in all these areas is considered to be an indication of the degree of assimilation of the knowledge and skills being imparted to them.

More tangibly the students are grouped into under performers, average performers and over performers on quantitative basis. Those scoring more than 60% are considered to be fast learners and given extra attention in the form of special guidance for career progression. Similarly, slow learners are under achievers who score below the class average and considered for remedial classes.

The average pass percentage of each class especially final year is considered to be an indication of the collective progress of the class. The ability of the student to get admissions in postgraduate courses after graduation from here is also considered to be one indicator of their being able to attain PO's.

From the current session it is proposed and being implemented that assimilation and PO and CO is being carried out by exit interviews. The result of these assessments will be discussed in detail during department-wise meetings and necessary reforms and amendments will be made in the teaching and evaluation process so that we will be able to optimize our resources fully and achieve the desired PO's and CO's.

It is mainly a Undergraduate institution where only one PG course (i.e. Masters in Commerce) is running at present. In this course, students are assigned with project work in their last semester. This project study mainly emphasize on grooming the research orientation of students. Faculties interact and guide students to make them acquaint with recent developments and opportunities in job and research related areas. Research Methodology is being taken up as a subject in MCom, which furnishes as a basic understanding for research as upcoming career option for the students.

The campus of the college houses the administrative building, Faculty of Arts, Staff room, Library, Gymnasium, Examination Section, NSS Room, Conference Hall and a well-equipped Computer Lab. In the Academic building there are Departments for the faculty of Science, Commerce, Journalism & Mass Communication and Tourism studies as well as 6 class rooms that can each accommodate 40 students. A multipurpose hall at the college can accommodate more than 200 people. The multipurpose hall is equipped with a badminton court as well. The College Library with 9466 books is automated with e-Granthalay. The books are being issued using the bar code scan. By allocating a portion of the total state funding for the purchase of the book, the College continue to make deliberate efforts to improve the library resources. For the optimum interests of the students, the library has an aim to soon subscribe to e-books and digital resources. The college administration has made concerted efforts to provide best of the ICT facilities to the college. The college campus had Wi-Fi connection with a 20 Mbps internet leased line from JIO till mid-2022. Now college is connected to SWAN (State Wide area Network) with 25Mbps speed. Whole campus is wifi enabled and major departments of the college are connected through Ethernet LAN. 24 best configuration HP desktops has been purchased under RUSA project. The college facilitated registration of the admission applicants through its official website for the academic year 2021–2022. The college has designated land for development of the basketball court. The platform of the same is prepared and further work is under process. About 100% of annual grant- in- aid (excluding salary components) from the state government is utilized for the infrastructure augmentation and the sustaining academic support facilities.

students are also rapidly integrating connected devices into their work,

Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including internet/Wi-Fi Internet Facility was provided by Reliance Jio which started on 09-11-2020 till June 2022. To supplement the lecture methodology through other teaching- learning techniques , use of computers /LED Projectors/ Smart Board is being adopted for which the college has two class rooms equipped with LED Projectors and smart boards. Faculty members are encouraged to complement their teaching with practical skill and make the learning process more effective and interesting. The teachers adopt as per the needs of their subjects/ programmes, ICT based lectures, power point presentation method are adopted, feedback is obtained by students. Edusat in the college is available for the benefit of students. Edusat is assisted by Uttarakhand Open University and facilitates the dissemination and transfer of the knowledge through teaching –learning process. The college office is well- connected with internet facility for smooth functioning. Students are encouraged to use e-resources. There is specific annual budget allocation for procurement, up-gradation, deployment and maintenance of the computers and their accessories. Maintenance of computers and its accessories are also done from the funds available in college. Library is automated and using Library Management Software e-granthalaya (Partial automation)

1. Title of the Practice: Community Engagement Initiative for Youth Empowerment (CEIYE)

2. Objectives of the Practice: CEIYE has following objectives:

? To provide necessary educational aids and course materials & infrastructural support to Government Inter College Beddhar, Narendranagar.

? To enhance the pace of personality development and capacity building of the students of far-flung government inter-college Beddhar which lacks in resources and infrastructure.

? To provide excellent educational environment in the interest of the students, it is necessary to provide financial assistance to government inter college Beddhar for equipment/materials & also support them with educational aids.

3. The Context: For skill development and capacity enhancement, under the CEIYE, Dharmanand Uniyal Government College, Narendranagar strives to provide financial assistance to nearby Government Inter College, Beddhar to support vibrancy in curriculum and infrastructure for educational up gradation. Most Inter colleges in far off locations do not have proper infrastructure like class rooms, black boards, drinking water, toilets and sanitary facilities. Identification of such inter colleges is the need of the hour to boost up the sound base to create holistic learning environment. It is known that Government Inter College Beddhar is a cherished school from where students take admission in Government College, Narendranagar for pursuing higher education after class 12th.

4. The Practice: Under the CEIYE, we focused on supporting educational environment & assisted in increasing the basic facilities in the far-flung Government Inter College, Beddhar, Tehri Garhwal of Narendranagar block where college provided reading material such as pen, pencil, rubber and curtains under educational facilities. Inverter, water cooler, carpets were donated. This effort of the teachers and staff of Degree college will undoubtedly be beneficial for promoting teaching and non-teaching activities. The future of the country i.e, youth devotes its energy to the development of the country, then no doubt we can establish a new dimension through education. With discipline, hard work and strong will in student life, new heights of success can be achieved.

5. Evidence of Success: Due to the positive involvement of college in student learning support system in the said inter college, students can improve their academic performance and gain accolades that promote their success, helping them feel more confident and enrich them with social activities imbining a feeling of brotherhood. The infrastructure provided to them, especially inverter has facilitated the students to an uninterrupted learning process in an area where power cuts are a norm. The students now have access to pure and clean drinking water which is a basic necessity for good health and physical development.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The notion that community has an important role in the education is long-standing and is a central theme of educational reforms. We, at college level wish to do such activities at school level but limited pool of resources do not allow us to do so. Faculties collect money for the donation of educational aids. Geographical constraints of the degree college also prove as a hindrance in such endeavors.

Best Practice 2: Sanskaarshala (Visit to Asha Kiran Sewa Ashram Narendranagar)

1. Title of the Practice: 'Sanskaarshala'

(Visits to Asha Kiran Sewa Aashram Narendranagar for the old and destitute)

2. Objectives of the Practice: The core philosophy of the college is sanskar, seva and samarpan, i.e. values, service and dedication. The students must be made sensible, responsible and dedicated citizens of the country. The student and staffs effort in providing a sincere and selfless care to people residing in the ashram inculcates the values of kindness, empathy and unconditional compassion in them. The objectives of this practice are

? To serve the elderly people by taking care of their physical, emotional, social and spiritual needs.

? To help the students understand the traumatic problems faced by desolate people.

? To inculcate in them a more humanitarian outlook and infuse values and ethics which will imbibe in their subconscious certain positive traits that are urgently needed in today's turbulent times.

3. The Context: Run by an NGO since 2004 'Asha Kiran Sewa Aashram' is home to the destitute elderly people and orphaned poor children from various area of Uttarakhand. To

inculcate universal human values like truth, righteous conduct, peace, love and non-violence which is directly associated to physical, intellectual, emotional psyche and other

aspects of human temperament, the college strives to motivate maximum participation in providing care, respect and love to the people residing in the ashram. There is an urgency to bolster these values for a better and more humane society. The students coming from different backgrounds have to develop their emotional quotient and empathetic outlook towards the social issues.

4. The Practice: Swayamsevis of the NSS unit of the college regularly visit the Asha Kiran Sewa Ashram. They distribute fruits, medicines, clothes and other such items required by them. They also support and communicate with the old age people. In turn they receive the love; warmth and experiences of old age. This exercise is taken up frequently throughout the year and has tremendous impact on the young minds. The enthusiasm of

the students is clearly evident in the way they eagerly participate in various activities conducted in the ashram, be it cleaning the ashram campus, vivacious discussions with the dwellers and other chores.

5. Evidence of Success: Rural areas of Uttarakhand face lots of problems, migration being the biggest of all. When people migrate out for better job opportunities, they leave behind their old age parents and relatives with nobody to take care of and look after. This becomes very traumatic and painful for these people. When our students visit the ashram, the old people feel recharged by the energy, love and support offered by our young students. The students are positively charged, and subconsciously learn the virtues of becoming a good human being.

5. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The exercise can be extended to other students of the college who are not a part of NSS. More resources are needed to fulfill the needs of the people.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

The focus and thrust of the government towards social inclusion and upliftment of society via targeting and supporting development activities at the lowest social strata through education resulted with a broader vision of professional courses like Tourism and Journalism offered in our college. Education is an important instrument that can garner and nurture the youth into an employable workforce and responsible citizens serving the country in various capacities. Professional degrees and courses are the need of the

present hour to build an employable youth and hone the talents of the youth in their chosen field.

With keeping in view the sustainable development goals and the importance of higher education as a leveraging tool, the government of Uttarakhand initiated and introduced popular professional course like tourism, journalism, B. B. A. and B.C.A, with distinctiveness. These courses have the potential to groom the youth into an employable workforce that makes invaluable contribution as skilled workforce that meets the industry's need are preferred to those having a regular degree. *Professional* qualification provides students with much better chances of getting a specific job. Students are trained and given exposure to specific skills and abilities required in that profession for which he/she aspires to build their career.

All these courses are run with nominal fee structure so that the students coming from lower income brackets and living in the hilly areas have access and opportunity to enroll themselves as employable workforce. Straight after earning their degrees, the students of these programs may get the opportunity to join their respective fields and start earning and add to the bandwagon of skilled taskforce. The college takes pride in announcing that the fees in which these courses are offered is the lowest not only in India but internationally as well.

Under graduate program in Tourism management (B.A.T.M) in Uttarakhand was initially introduced in our college in 2016. Provision is made for training, field visit and placement. Our tourism students are our pride in entrepreneurship and seeking jobs in Grand Hyaat, Goa and in different other organisations. The outcomes of tourism course are significant and despite resource crunch, we have provided quality education to hone the latent talent of budding tourism professionals. Artificial Rock-Climbing wall is constructed in College, which is first of its' kind in North India in Government Colleges.

Dharmanand Uniyal Government Degree College Narendranagar becomes the first Government College where an undergraduate course entitled B.A (Honours) in Journalism & Mass Communication is introduced in regular mode. Another uniqueness of the program is that in the whole of North India our college is offering this course with a minimal fee structure for the sake of the students who belong to lower income brackets and are dwelling in semi urban and rural tribal areas. Beginning with its founder batch in 2017, today the students have joined the media world in various capacities. During the semester breaks and after completing the course many students take up internships where they learn the finer points and gain experience of the field. Despite the financial challenges and resource constraints, the students are able to showcase their mantle and caliber in the field and are doing good work.

Bachelors of Business Administration program started off in 2022 is committed to create global management professionals based on the needs of Indian and international industries. BBA graduates have high scope in various business/ industries with lucrative pay since this program has a greater impact on their growth. The program also enriches the leadership and entrepreneurship qualities of the learners. This course is designed to provide a basic understanding of management with inculcation of decision making, entrepreneurship skills and also train the students in communication skills effectively. The students are having ample opportunities to become an employer or employee in the areas of banking, education, marketing, consultancy, export, insurance and other manufacturing and service sectors. The curriculum tries to implement the contemporary managerial skills which are required in the industry. The curriculum focuses on management subjects related to entrepreneurship, leadership, marketing, HR, operations, finances, communication, and organizational behavior and even in the areas of business values and ethics. It enables the students to think systematically and manage intelligently in the affairs related to business, governance and organization. This curriculum is a perfect blend of management theory and its effective practices through institution training, projects and Industrial Visits. BBA program is designed to provide a

clear understanding of business oriented concepts. The program prepares the students to meet the challenges of industry.

Commencing in 2022, the Bachelor in Computer Applications program, at its nascent stage, is in line with the demands of the IT sector. The program focuses on subjects such as programming, operating systems, software engineering, web designing, databases, net technologies and computer networks. The programme provides excellent technical and analytical skills for careers in the IT industry or to pursue further studies under programmes such as MCA / MSc(IT) / MBA etc. The programme is designed to produce computer professionals possessing excellent programming knowledge with good managerial skills. Students will be trained with a view of holding positions such as: System Analyst, System Designers, Programmers, Database Administrators, Software Test Engineers and Network Engineers. There is a growing need for qualified computer engineers and a BCA degree can help students create a multi-faceted career in the industry and can be employed in these sectors: healthcare, IT, finance, trading, transportation, software, and education. Computer engineers are some of the highest paid professionals today. After receiving a BCA degree students can be among the top most well paid fresher in the industry with a lucrative base salary.
